Re: January 2024 Financial Statements

The January 2024 Agencywide Revenue and Expenditure Report and Balance Sheet are enclosed for your review. Financial reports are reviewed by the Executive Committee prior to inclusion in the meeting packet.

The Agencywide Revenue and Expense report compares actual year to date receipts and expenses to the FY23-24 budget adopted by the Commission at the May 25, 2023 meeting. The financial operations of the agency are somewhat fluid and projects, added and modified throughout the year, along with the high volume of Workforce program activities, impact the adopted budget. To provide clarity, Commission and Workforce Development Board activities are separated on the agencywide report.

As of month-end January 2024 (58% of the fiscal year), Commission year to date revenues are 56% and expenses are 59% of adopted budget. The two largest budget expense lines, Salary and Fringe, are in line with budget at 57% and 65%, respectively.

Looking at the balance sheet, Accounts Receivable is \$965,786. Of this total, Workforce receivables are \$424,185 (44%) and current. The Executive Committee reviews all aged receivables over 60 days and no receivables are deemed uncollectible. Net Projects (\$194,305) represents project expenses, primarily benchmark projects, that cannot be invoiced yet and posted to receivables.

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February 16, 2024 Executive Director's Report

Economic Development:

- The NRV Recovery Ecosystem Program is setting up technical teams to support program development and serve in an advisory capacity during implementation. Technical teams forming include communications, transportation, mobile outreach and treatment services, and education/training.
- Broadband: The Montgomery/Bland and Pulaski County projects are nearing completion of the engineering required for make-ready (pole attachments) which has identified over 1,000 utility poles that need to be addressed for a variety of reasons. Appalachian Power and the internet service providers are establishing sequencing stratgies for the poles that aligns with the build-out process.
- The NRV/Danville Tech Hubs project will hold interviews this month for the Regional Innovation Officer position. We are still reviewing candidates, so feel free to share the advertisement at this Link. A two-part consortium meeting is being planned for April which will be an industry panel explaining their technology (to be held on zoom), followed by a site visit at a partner firm so everyone can observe the technology first-hand.
- The Regional Economic Strategy (RES) committee will hold their second meeting of the year next Friday. The group will be reviewing updated data with a focus on equity. The data will be shared with the Regional Commission at the March meeting. Draft strategies and projects will come to the board for review at the May meeting with a RES update at the June meeting.

Transportation:

- The NRV Passenger Rail Station Authority will hold their regular monthly meeting on 2/22. Staff from the Virginia Passenger Rail Authority (VPRA) will share additional information about the potential Cinnabar Road station location that was identified in the 30% design phase. The 30% design summary slides are available on the VPRA website at this Link.
- The Virginia Passenger Rail Authority held their first public meeting on the project on 1/29. Close to 200 citizens participated. VPRA will be conducting additional public engagement in the region at some point in April. Once information is available we will distribute. A public survey is open until 2/29. Please share broadly via this <u>link</u>.

Natural Resources:

The New River Conservancy will be hosting the New River Symposium on April 11-12 at
Radford University. A diverse range of partners attend and present at the symposium from
the entire watershed. The theme for the event is Rivers^3: Reconnect; Restore; Recreate.
Anyone interested is welcome to attend. Kathleen Armstrong will be a plenary presenter
discussing the New River Water Trail Expansion project. More information here

Re: Regional Housing Trust Fund update

After the release of the Regional + Local Housing Study in 2021, the final report recommended seven regional strategies, one of which was the creation of a **regional housing trust fund**. A \$2M housing development grant from Virginia Housing enabled the Regional Commission to pilot this concept. Since the fall of 2022, the Regional Commission has worked closely with a regional stakeholder group to create program guidelines and solicit funding applications, ultimately awarding \$1.8M in housing development funds for the construction of 106 units in the region.

The Regional Commission is now seeking \$600,000 in local investment through local government and non-government partners to continue the work of the regional housing trust fund.

Background + Documentation of Need

In 2018, the Regional Commission received grant funding from Virginia Housing to conduct a **regional + local housing study**. The Commission partnered with the Virginia Tech Center for Housing Research and HousingForward Virginia to assist with data collection and analysis, identify best practices throughout the Commonwealth, and create action-oriented implementation strategies. The study documented intense housing need in the region, citing low inventory, rising construction and labor costs, and lack of affordability as primary contributing factors.

Ongoing project guidance was provided by 1) the Housing Study Consortium, a large advisory board that met quarterly and comprised representatives from local government staff, area nonprofits, lenders, bankers, realtors, and housing service providers and 2) the Housing Study Leadership Team, a smaller working group that met monthly and included local government staff and other housing experts.

The study was completed in early 2021, and the final report consisted of a comprehensive detailed report and a summarized consumer report, both highlighting regional and local data findings and identifying seven regional strategy recommendations and dozens of tailored local strategies. Strengthening the Region through Collaboration

Moving to Implementation

In 2021, Virginia Housing announced its "PDC Housing Development" grant program, and the Commission was awarded \$2M. While the ultimate goal of the funding program is development of affordable housing units, the Commission saw this as an opportunity to pursue implementation of the regional housing study, and with the blessing of the funder, the Commission intends to pursue the creation of a regional housing trust fund.

A housing trust fund is defined as a dedicated, set-aside funding source for the preservation or development of affordable housing. Among many benefits, a regional approach to this concept allows for the **pooling of resources** (financial and administrative) to create more substantive and impactful housing projects.

To assist with the planning process, the Commission created a small **Technical Team** of six regional partners as well as a larger 25-member **Oversight Board** of regional stakeholders and representing local government staff, lenders, realtors, nonprofit housing organizations, universities, health care institutions, and more.

The Virginia Housing pilot funding was awarded in 2023 to two local housing development projects: 1) \$850,000 to Landmark Development for the Claremont School Apartments in the town of Pulaski and 2) \$950,000 to Community Housing Partners for the Legacy on Main project in the Town of Blacksburg. The two developments will collectively contribute 106 units of affordable housing to the region.

Long-Term Funding and Oversight

Beyond the initial pilot funding, the NRV Housing Trust Fund Oversight Board considered three annual funding scenarios to operate the Fund long-term and chose the most conservative at \$600,000/year. This annual target is intended to be shared 50/50 between local governments and non-government entities. The \$300,000 in local government investment was calculated at a per capita rate of \$1.75. An additional \$300,000 is being sought from the region's universities, healthcare providers, and other major employers. Investment is being sought on an annual basis, but funding commitments for a five-year cycle are vital for regional equity.

To maximize funding potential and administrative oversight, the NRV Housing Trust Fund will coordinate with the existing **NRV HOME Consortium**. HOME funds are a federal allocation from the Dept of Housing and Urban Development and dispersed throughout the region on a **five-year cycle**. The NRV Housing Trust Fund intends to follow this same rotation, which allows localities to successfully plan for substantive housing projects that **meet their unique and individual needs**.

As a means of providing long-term organizational structure for the Housing Fund, the Commission is pursuing the creation of a **501(c)(3) nonprofit**.

Re: New River Valley Passenger Rail Update

At the February Regional Commission meeting I will provide an update on the New River Valley passenger rail project. During the January meeting, slides were shared from the Virginia Passenger Rail Authority (VPRA) that summarized the 30% design from their consulting engineering team. This month will be an opportunity dive deeper into project since last month it was a brief overview during the Executive Director's Report on the agenda. The New River Valley Passenger Rail Station Authority is scheduled to meet on February 22nd and will be learning more about Option A, which is a station location at Cinnabar Road just east of US 460 Bypass. Content from the Authority meeting earlier in the day will be shared with the Commission in the evening.
